COMMUNITY EDUCATION

COMMUNITY EDUCATION – HOW TO REGISTER FOR CLASSES

Avoid the frustration of a canceled class and sign up early!

Most classes are required to have 10-15 fully-paid students enrolled a week before the class starts to allow the class to run. If your class is cancelled, you will receive a refund in the mail. We will attempt to contact all affected students in the case of a cancelled class.

Important: When you register for a course at COS, you will be given a COS student email address. This is how the campus will communicate with you regarding changes to your class, cancellations and other information. Be sure you know how to access this email account and read it regularly or have it forwarded to an email address you do read regularly.

REGISTERING ONLINE

STEP 1: APPLY

Complete a COS Web Application.

If you have already applied to COS and have a student account, skip to Step 2. First-time COS students must submit an Admissions application using CCCApply. Submit the application online and print a copy of the confirmation page for your records. This will give you a CCC ID number. Then you will need to apply to College of the Siskiyous specifically. Within 24 hours, you will receive an email with your College of the Siskiyous Student ID and Username.

STEP 2: REGISTER

- Once you receive your email, log into your mySiskiyous account using your Username and your password. Your password will be your six-digit date of birth in this format MMDDYY (for example: 011585). You will have the option to change it. Log into your mySiskiyous account and become familiar with your new student account.
- Previous students or students applying for regular admission may register for the class through mySiskiyous on the home page www.siskiyous.edu. Community Education classes will be found with (X) following the genre of class in the Subject box. Noncredit and Life Long Learning class information is listed (Course / CRN). NONCREDIT - TUITION FREE COURSES

The goal of adult education in California is to provide citizens of every age and educational level the opportunity to develop civic responsibility, a realization of the human potential, effective human relationships, and economic self-sufficiency. Noncredit courses often appeal to students who are unclear about their educational goals and may have significant work or family demands. Noncredit may serve as first point of entry for many underserved students as well as transition point to credit instruction. The course roster featured in this brochure is for the upcoming spring semester 2018.

WHAT IS NONCREDIT?

- Noncredit education is designed to supplement your continued growth and to enhance your employment opportunities through classes, ranging from basic skills, health care, health & wellness, to short-term vocational, workforce prep training and job retraining, those looking to obtain a high school diploma or equivalency, and individuals with disabilities through specifically targeted courses. Enrollment in noncredit is FREE and continues throughout the year. All noncredit classes are subject to budget and attendance. Noncredit is “open access” and exit and does not require official letter grades. Noncredit courses are repeatable. Noncredit is open to all individuals from diverse backgrounds and those seeking ways to improve their earning power and access to higher education.
- Noncredit courses are actual credit courses but not transferrable. Noncredit offers a bridge and educational transition to credit classes, through skill building courses
- Noncredit courses serve the needs of students, parents, older adults, and those looking to obtain a high school diploma or equivalency, and increase basic or job-specific skills. Noncredit courses may serve as first point of entry for many students, as well as a transition point to credit instruction. Noncredit is also for individuals with disabilities looking for an opportunity to increase their skills through specifically targeted courses.
- This broad goal forms the basis for the courses and programs the College of the Siskiyous offers and is working on offering in each of the authorized categories of noncredit instruction which include: English as a Second Language (ESL), elementary and secondary basic skills, citizenship, health and safety, older adults, parenting, special education for adults, short-term vocational, home economics (consumer science), and workforce preparation

NONCREDIT IN DETAIL

Where do classes meet?

Most classes meet at the Yreka campus and the Weed campus. A few classes will be held in local communities. Addresses will be given for the classes that meet off campus. The goal in the future is to offer our noncredit courses countywide, to better serve our community.
