MILESTONES

The Board of Trustees appointed Carl Ehmann as the Interim Superintendent / President from September 1, 2001 through July 31, 2002.

W. David Pelham, Vice President for Academic Affairs at Spartanburg Technical College, was selected by the Board of Trustees to serve as Superintendent / President for the College of the Siskiyous.

The Board of Governors visited the Weed Campus in November 2001 to conduct a Regular Board meeting, tour the campus, and meet with COS staff and the public. The campus hosted a dinner for the Board of Governors.

COS participated in a Higher Education Needs Assessment for Northern California, sponsored by the McConnell Foundation. Six counties were assessed: Shasta, Siskiyou, Trinity, Lassen, Modoc and Tehama.

Sandra Pfeiffer, of Weed, was the 2002 graduation student speaker. 150 students received Associate degrees and 120 received program certificates.

All campus computers were converted to Windows 2000 and Microsoft

Outlook. Training was made available to all staff.

Campus building projects included the following: campus-wide architectural barrier removal; remodeling of McCloud Hall adding new faculty offices, a computer-graphics lab, classroom and a photo lab; new Athletic Training Center; and, began construction for the new Distance Learning facility.

North Tree Fire International established a Crisis Response Information System for the Weed Campus and the Yreka Center; developing an interactive virtual CD with campus tours, an Emergency Crisis Action Plan, and a Crisis Action Team.

COS Fire Emergency / Response Technology Partnership Program received the Community College Association of Occupational Educators Award for Excellence in four categories: leadership, partnership, faculty, and program.

AmeriCorps / America Reads co-hosted two Volunteer Expositions recruiting volunteers to assist Siskiyou County agencies and businesses; and, hosted a Cultural

Awareness Festival in celebration of Martin Luther King's Birthday.

The California Department of Forestry held a two-week training academy on the Weed Campus.

Developed a Crisis Action Plan and implemented the Crisis Action Team.

COS was one of four statewide community colleges chosen by the Chancellor's Office to participate as a transfer focus site. Other colleges were Laney College, West Los Angeles College and San Diego City College.

A Planning Process was implemented by the campus which requires data-driven, decision-making. Three institutional planning processes and committee structure workshops kicked off the new process.

Three new alternative Associate Degrees were instituted for graduating students: 1) General Studies, 2) Occupational, and 3) University Transfer.

Notice was received from the US Copyright Office that the District holds the official copyright for "Siskiyou Infosys," an information

system which registers, collects, and processes student and course information.

The Financial Aid Office awarded \$3,505,422 in Pell Grants, Federal Work Study Grants, scholarships, and loans.

An Advanced Connections Customer Service Training Program for campus personnel.

COS hosted the following activities and events:

- A Baseball Clinic with retired professional Dodger Baseball Player Elliott “Bump” Wills.
- A Diversity Workshop with members of the National Consortium for Academics and Sports.
- Conducted a Time / Motion Study for Custodial Services.
- A Career and College Day with college, university and vocational representatives providing informational workshops.
- An Aids Awareness Day and a National Substance Abuse Awareness and Red Ribbon Week.
- The play, *The Winds of Weed*, in commemoration of the City of Weed’s Centennial Celebration, written by James Witherell, a retired COS instructor.

- The annual Children’s Christmas Party, *Christmas Time Around the World*, for all students children.
- A Technology and Resource Fair for individuals with disabilities.
- The annual high school Principal-Counselor Luncheon.
- The 3rd annual AmeriCorps / America Reads Program Graduation.
- The 8th grade Inspiration Day with an egg drop, essay, and art contest.
- Conducted an Elderhostel Program offering courses on the Geology of Mt. Shasta, a historical walking tour of Dunsmuir, and a trip on the Sunset Dinner Train.
- Women’s History Month celebration with an art exhibit, writing contests, film festival, a concert by the Ladies Chamber Choir, and an afternoon tea ceremony.

OUTSTANDING ACHIEVEMENTS

STUDENTS:

Thirty-five students each received a \$1,551 award from new Competitive Cal Grants Program.

Seventy-four Student Support Services students received a \$474 supplemental grant from the US Department of Education and the COS Board of Trustees.

Seven students were recognized in the *Talent Roster of Outstanding Transfer Students from Community Colleges*: Erin Daugherty, Timothy DeRoss, Kimberly Feliciano, Alice Knudsen, Brian Sapp, Sara Simpson, and Jason Wardrop.

Sixteen students enrolled in the ECE Program; each receiving a \$1,000 grant from the California Student Aid Commission for Child Development Grant Program.

Steve Linsley, of the MESA Program, participated in the two-week Camp MESA Program in Santa Cruz, CA.

Ford Family Foundation selected two COS students as members of the Class of 2001 Ford Scholars.

The Licensed Vocational Nurses Program had a 100% pass rate for the State licensure examination and received the full four-year Reaffirmation of Accreditation from the Board of Nursing.

Josh Crechriou, of Gazelle, received a \$300 California Mathematics Council Scholarship.

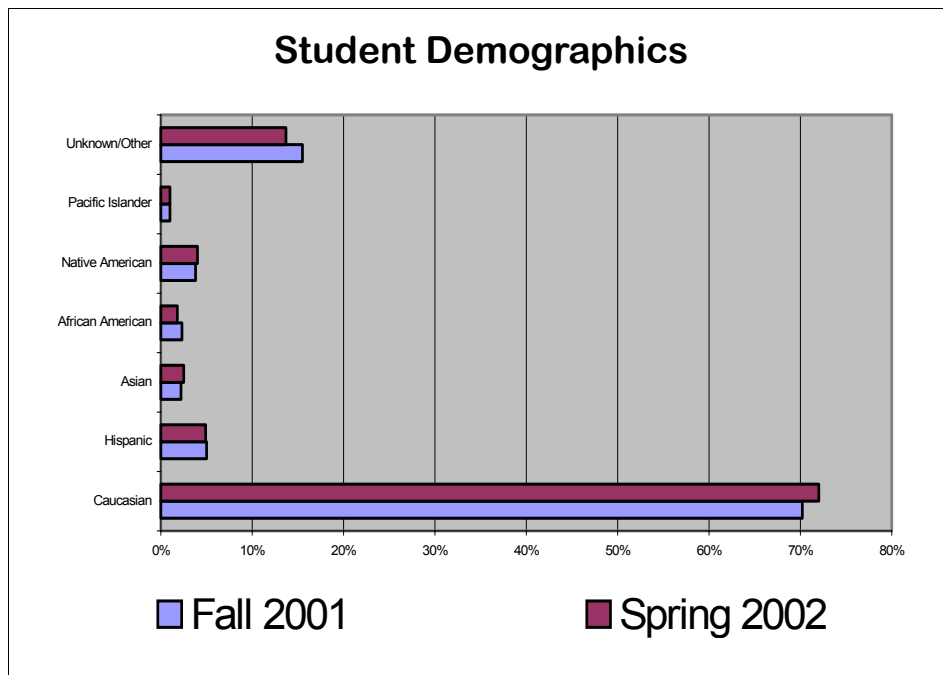
Sara Blankenship, of Weed, published an article in the Fall 2001 edition of *College Bound Magazine*.

Eleven students were chosen for scholarship awards for 2002—2003 from the COS Foundation totaling \$8,500

Cross Country athletes finished 2nd and 3rd in the GVC Championships. Rosanna Hall took 2nd place and Sabina Prosvirnin, 3rd.

COS Track and Field was named Golden Valley Conference Champions.



Women's Golf Team finished 2nd in the Bay Valley Conference. Melanie Dawson, Mary Green and Connie Huckaba, were voted *All Conference*.

Sandra Pfeiffer, of Weed, was named a United States National Collegiate Award Winner in Nursing by the United States Achievement Academy. She also received two nursing scholarships from the COS Foundation.

Woman's Basketball athlete, Tiosha Harrison was named to the North Region All-State Team, the All-Golden Valley Conference Team, and was named the GVC's Freshman Player of the Year.

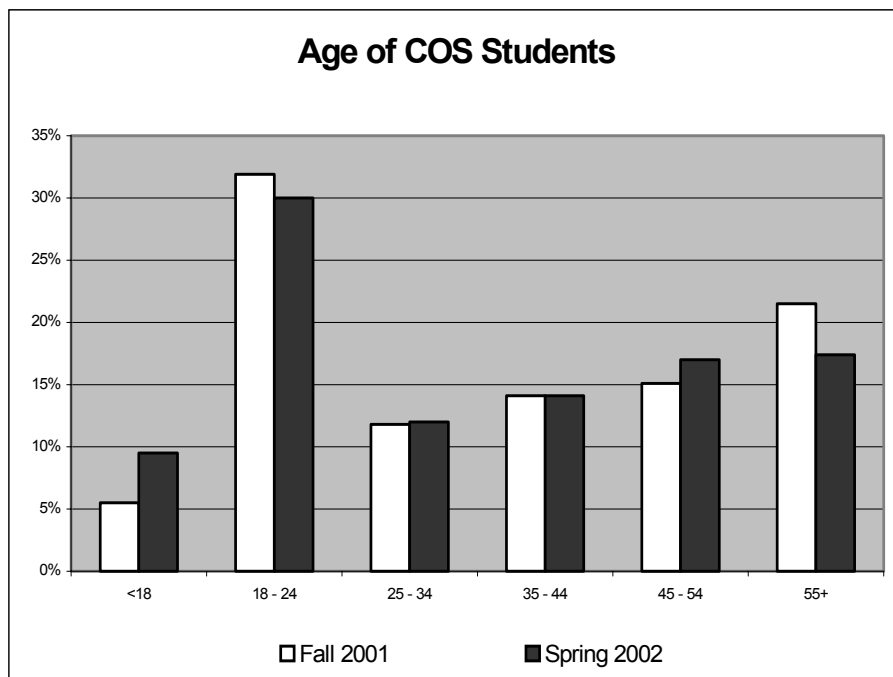
Pole Vault,er, Mika Pico, took first place and set a school record of 15'6" at the Merv Smith Track and Field Invitational. He also placed third at the American Community College National Elite Meet taking home an All-American Honor Award.

Mika Pico set yet another school record in pole vaulting at 16 feet at the Siskiyou Invitational Track Meet. Also placing first were: Eli Markstrom in the 200M; John Milleson in the 400M; Tamara Thompson, Women's 400M; Miki Paiva in the Women's Pole Vault; Jesse Gardner, Javelin; Keith Cage, High Jump; Matt Layton, Shot Put.

Eli Markstrom took first in the 200M and John Milleson took first in the 400M at the Woody Wilson Track Invitational.

Women's athletic teams won the Tom O'Conner Team Sportsmanship Award for the 4th consecutive year.

COS Placed 17th overall at the California State Track and Field Championship and tied for first in the Golden Valley Conference League. Mika Pico placed 2nd overall in the pole vault with a vault of 16'. Mika started the competition ranked third in the state; Jesse Gardner placed 3rd in the javelin with a lifetime best of 180'4". He started the meet ranked 14th in the state and



was also was the only javelin thrower to beat the south. Matt Ledbetter, ranked 17th going into the state meet, placed 5th in the javelin with a throw of 173'03". Eli Markstrom, also ranked 17th going into the state meet, placed 8th in the 200M with a time of 22.03 seconds.

\$204,226 Student Support Services Grant to provide counseling, tutoring and comprehensive student support services.

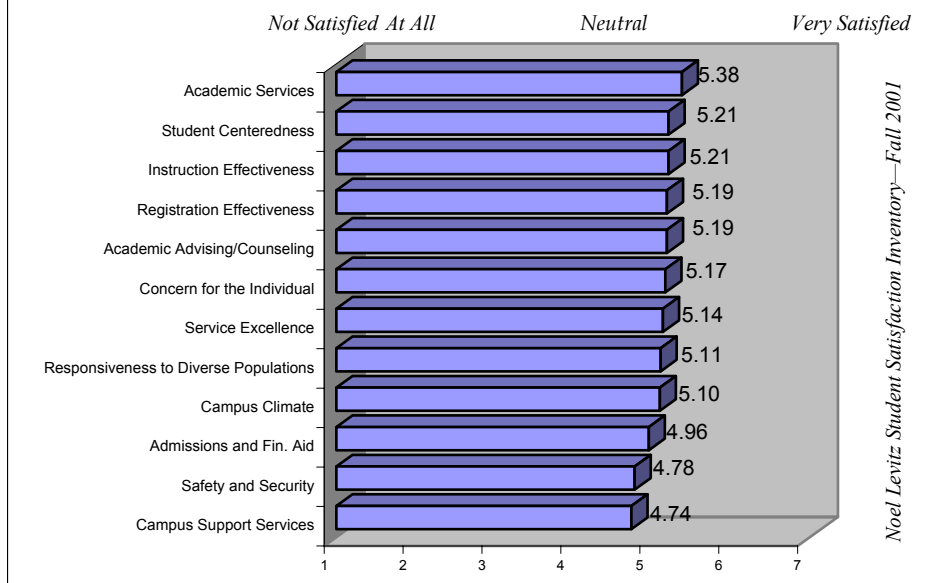
\$132,330 allocation for Part-Time Faculty Compensation Funds to be used to reduce the disparity between part and full-time faculty compensation.
